
ASHLEY CENTENNIAL





In the fall of 1981 there were four families in the now called Ashley area. The railroad played a big part in Ashley's start. Ansel H. Phinney, George P. Dudley and Miles Bullock, formerly of Howell, Michigan, assumed that the Ann Arbor Railroad, which was under construction, would adopt Ashley as a depot location. They surveyed the land and purchased pieces around the area. The original plat of Ashley was done in the fall of 1883. it was certified in 1984. The settlement is named Ashley in honor of James M. Ashley, the promoter and builder of the Ann Arbor Railroad which was built through Ashley and is still in limited use.
