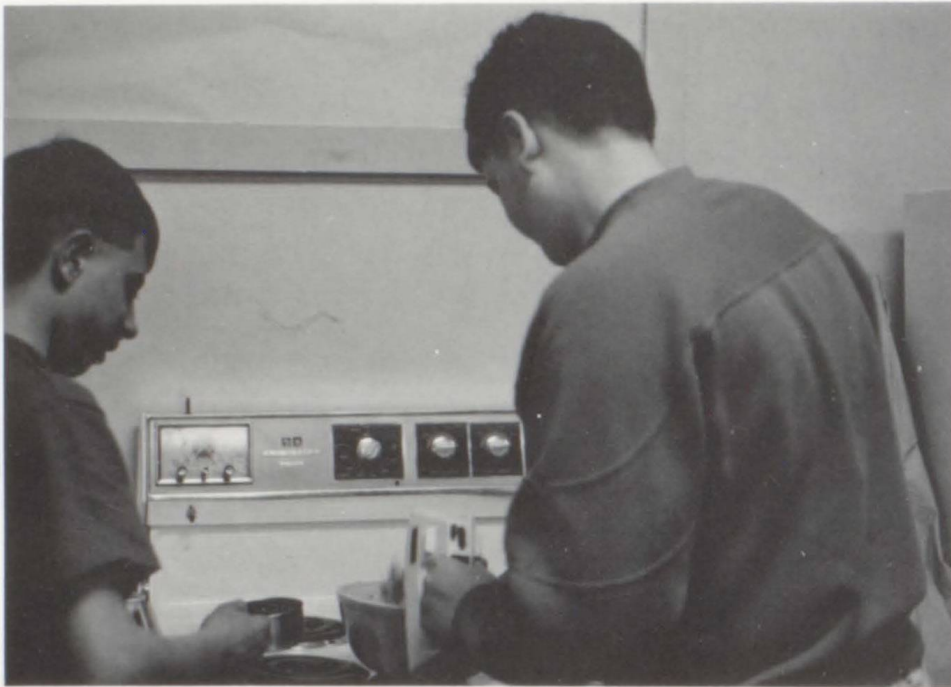


# ALL THIS TIME
