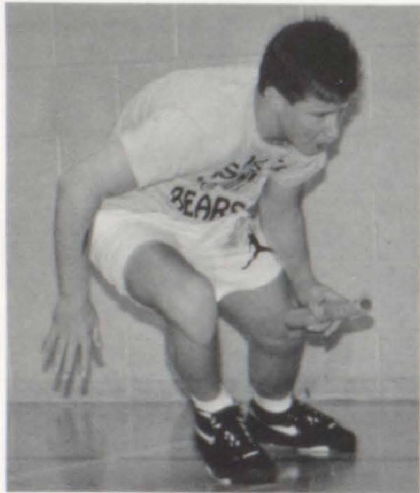
In speech class, students demonstrated how to fish, do origami and style hair. In the eighth grade English class,
