Working together and under tight deadlines are familiar activities for the journalism class. In fact, several journalism students said meeting deadlines was the hardest part of the class.


"We always have a deadline to meet," Brianna Yelsik said. "It doesn't matter if we have something to do the night before, the work still has to be done."
