Larsen commented about projects, "It gives them a chance to think for themselves. Today's industries are not looking for robots. They want people who will work on their own initiative."

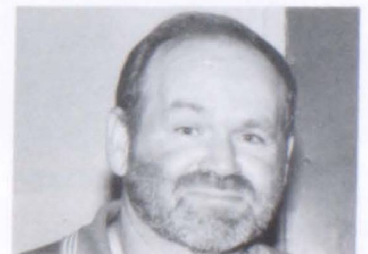
